

The Lenten Journey

Dear Friends,

During our journey through Lent, I have been struck by how many of us are finding a chance to listen for God in a new way, or are responding to God's invitation of love. The large number of groceries gathering by Tracy's office door, heading off to the Bedford food pantry, the Esperanza poster, with Esperanza-bound supplies nestled next to it, and the conversations unfolding during our Adult Education Class let me know that many of us are deepening our Christian practice this season. My most meaningful Lenten moment to date unfolded in my car on the way home from church a week ago. It wasn't what I experienced, but the story I was told, that has mattered most to me. Ben and I were talking together, and he was letting me know what Church School was like for him. "We learned a lot about how Jesus suffered for us," he said, "you know... that time in the wilderness, when Jesus didn't eat bread because there was something more important?" "Mmmmmmm," I offered, as I drove down Pine Hill and kept my eyes on the road. And then Ben told me of his first grade teacher (Sima Seymourian) who brought jelly beans to class, and put them in a dish on the table. She told the children the wilderness story in a way that let them understand it, and then she invited each of them to practice experiencing what Jesus did. She invited them to resist eating the jelly beans - "for the WHOLE time," said my son. The children drew pictures- Ben's was called "Even the weirdest things can come true with God's help" - and they talked about temptation, and what it means to resist it. I saw Ben flash a smile in the car mirror as he said... "and then, at the end of class, she let us EAT them!"

I found myself marveling at a teacher who could challenge first graders to experience just the right amount of temptation, and then reward them with delicious candy at the end. Somehow, Sima found just the right amount of temptation, and just the right amount of encouragement, to bring first graders an important revelation about Jesus and his church. I'm so grateful for her and her wisdom. I'm so thankful to all our teachers and musicians who miss part of "big church" to make our children's Christian education so meaningful.

Katie West

Katie lives in Bedford with her husband, Paul, and her cat, Amelia. She is a 'native New Englander', growing up in Worcester. She did her undergraduate studies at Worcester State University and her graduate work at The State University of New York at Geneseo. Katie is a pediatric audiologist and is currently the Coordinator of Audiology Services at Children's Hospital Boston at Lexington. She works with infants and young children, diagnosing hearing loss, recommending hearing aids and guiding parents through the habilitation process. She also evaluates children with suspected central auditory processing disorders which has become an area of specialty for her.

Prior to her position in Lexington, Katie worked at The Fernald Center in Waltham, Children's Hospital Boston and Franciscan Children's Hospital in Brighton. CATECHESIS CORNER

Dear Catechesis families.

The children's beautiful felt Alleluia banners are tucked away as we are in the heart of our Lenten season. Ask them why? Catechesis II has prepared a Lenten Garden which is in the Narthex for all to admire and will be placed in the Garden of Repose come Maundy Thursday. Both Catechesis 1 and 2 have acted out the Last Supper and discussed what Jerusalem was like at the time of Jesus.

Our last session begins Sunday, April 3rd. Due to Easter and April vacation our classes are few. We will discuss Jesus and the Tomb and on **Palm Sunday the children will be treated to an amazing puppet show prepared and performed by the 4th and 5th graders.** The skits present the story beginning with Jesus' entrance to Jerusalem & ending with his resurrection; a very moving summation to all our lessons during this Lenten time. We urge all the children to attend.

April 3rd will be a Family Sunday, with all children starting in church. The younger group is welcomed back to its Atrium after the sermon.



United Thank Offering

The mission of the United Thank Offering (UTO) is to invite people to offer daily prayers of thanksgiving to God, and to offer outward and visible signs of those prayers by dropping coins into a small box. These coins of thanksgiving are used to benefit others through grants distributed domestically and internationally.

UTO grants support projects that address poverty of women and children. The grants focus particularly on projects that help alleviate profound human suffering—part of the Church's Millennium Development Goals.

UTO began in 1889 at the General Convention (which meets every three years). The Women's Auxiliary collected the money at the General Convention and their focus was on expanding the mission of the church. Grants supported training women in the church, supporting and sending women missionaries domestically and overseas and funding the building of schools, hospitals and church buildings all over the United States.UTO has since grown from a triennial disbursement to an annual disbursement, from a women's only initiative to a men's, women's, and children's initiative. In 1952, Bishop Gordon of Alaska was awarded a UTO grant for an airplane so that he may reach the parishes within his vast diocese. He coined the phrase "Blue Box" for the little boxes in which the coins are placed. In tribute, he dubbed the airplane "Blue Box" as well.

All the money collected in the Blue Boxes is granted once per year. The funds collected from January 1 – December 31, 2011 are awarded for use during September 2012 and September 2013. The United Thank Offering Board makes the grant awards in the two years between General Convention. In a convention year, the Board, after research and review, recommends grants to the delegates of the Triennial Meeting of the Episcopal Church Women.

Last year, UTO approved 69 grants globally, either fully or partially for a total of over **\$2 million**! In the US a couple of the grants went towards rebuilding a handicapped-accessible playground and purchasing a walk-in refrigerator to support a parish's food pantry. In Maseno, Kenya, where our Jubilee initiative is centered, UTO provided a grant in 2009 to the local mission hospital for the maternity ward.

We have UTO boxes ("Blue Boxes") in the Narthex for you to bring home. St. Paul's annual United Thank Offering (UTO) Ingathering will be **October 2**, **2011**. Please count your own offering from your UTO box, write a check for the equivalent amount made payable to St. Paul's, <u>marked "UTO" in the memo space</u> (this is important). Place the check in a UTO offering envelope (found on the table in the Narthex) and put it in the offerfory. If you have questions about I
