Dear Friends,

Sunday, November 29, was the first Sunday of Advent. Advent, at least in our part of the world, begins almost concurrently with the shortening of days. There are more hours of darkness than light during the month of Advent. Daylight hours begin to lengthen near the end of December, this year around December 21. At first this phenomenon is imperceptible but nevertheless light begins to overtake the darkness.

Advent for us Episcopalians is truly a time that disrupts our spiritual journey. When we put aside the preparations for celebration, and even in the midst of them, we are invited to be mindful of what God has done for us. God has moved us, once and for all, out of spiritual darkness into the glorious light of love and salvation.

Each year the church invites us again to imagine again the waiting in the darkness. Each year the church calls us to contemplate why we wait, what we wait for and what God is giving us. In the midst of the spiritual darkness we know that the appropriate response to this kind of waiting is joy, anticipation, excitement. No wonder we see our children breathless with hope and certainty that something wonderful will happen on Christmas day.

In a way the Christmas celebrations and traditions of our families are sacramental. They really are outward signs of the underlying truth of the magnanimity of God. The presents, the decorations, the food, the gathering of friends and family are all outward signs of God's grace and love for us. Preparing for these celebrations each year sometimes can be overwhelming, I know. Shopping, cooking, decorating and having it all done by December 24th (usually), is a lot of work. But it is worth it in the end. I have never heard anyone say they were sorry or regretted all the preparation on Christmas Day.

These preparations we make this month are another outward sign of what Advent is about. When I think of this I am reminded of John the Baptist's famous words, "Prepare the way of the Lord." If we spend our Advent time motivated by this invitation of John, all our preparations will have the intent of Advent in them.

Waiting can be aggravating, I know. But when we wait for something that is a guaranteed blessing the waiting has a different nature. It is filled with confidence. It invites breathless anticipation. Sometimes the waiting and anticipation is so filled with excitement we don't want the waiting itself to end.

Our Advent waiting ends by God's will. It ends with the greatest of God's gifts. Our Advent ends with God's self entering into our personal and communal lives in Jesus Christ. This great gift is never ending. It is the ultimate gift of love.

This year, as we wait again for our celebrations at church and home, let's remember that this waiting time brings us out of the darkness into the light. And that light of Christ overpowers all darkness for all time. Let's wait with joy!


Elementary Sunday School News
