

Dear Friends,

Advent is the season before Christmas when we prepare for the birth of Christ; we are invited to wait in silence and prepare a place for the Christ child in our own hearts. That can be a challenge in the busy-ness of the time between Thanksgiving and Christmas Day. Many people spend that time rushing around buying presents, worrying about money, and cooking and cleaning frantically as family begins to arrive. We are invited into a different rhythm. We who are Christian are invited to make room in our hearts. There is meant to be an empty place in our hearts on December 25th so that the Christ child can begin to fill it when he arrives. Less is more in Advent.

The weeks of Advent are about preparing a place. I invite you to spend five minutes in silence each day, to have one hour a week when you take a silent walk – with or without a dog (!). Maybe it will be singing, or giving, or cooking that will give you some peace and some perspective on your own life. What do you lack? Where are you weary? Those places are the places Christ longs to be, gently bringing his new life to restore and renew.

Blessings to all as the season unfolds; may you find yourself in silence.

Fifty-five years ago this month, on December 18, 1955, the very first service of St. Paul's Mission Church was held at the American Legion Hall on Great Road in Bedford. Leading the service was Mr. Henry Bird, a young seminarian who would eventually be ordained and become St. Paul's first priest-in-charge. From those humble beginnings, our parish has grown and changed through the decades to become the welcoming, vibrant place we know and love today.

As we enter this season of Advent—a season of waiting and reflection—we are reminded of the bravery, faith, and patience our founding members showed in the early years of St. Paul's. Having spent many months in study and prayer, they embarked on a new adventure: bringing an Episcopal church to a growing suburb, not knowing whether it would succeed or fail. This Advent we too are spending time in study and prayer, trusting in the work of our search committee as they review and prepare to interview candidates for our next rector, the seventh person to lead our parish fulltime since its founding.

Amid the busy-ness of all the various missions, initiatives, celebrations, and ministries that St. Paul's engages in every December—from the Advent Fair to our caroling and progressive supper, from the pageant to our Christmas Eve services, from the Giving Tree to our Christmas offering—we encourage you to find a moment to give thanks for those men and women in 1955 who took a leap of faith and created St. Paul's. We are blessed to be part of their legacy.

THIS HOLIDAY SEASON, HELP OUR VA RESIDENTS AND A REFUGEE FAMILY IN BEDFORD





Dear Linus Knitters of St. Paul's,

I'll be most grateful if St. Paul's would place me on their prayer list for healing. In July I crashed, head first, into a door and broke a bone in my neck, at the 2nd cervical vertebra. Hospital x-rays at that time did not discover it. Eight weeks later, after not much improvement, I had an MRI and there it was. I've been in a rigid neck brace 24/7 since then, in the hopes it will heal. If not, I will require surgery, which I desperately want to avoid.

The power of prayer is remarkable, and I ask my friends at St. Paul's if they will include me in their prayers for healing. I so want to get back to taking care of my family, and our 1 yr. old granddaughter, and Project Linus. These past months have been a real challenge; two lessons I am learning is patience and letting others have control. I am working to remain open to other lessons our Lord has to teach me through this challenging time.




