### **Advent: A Time for Hope in the Darkness**

A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them. The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den. (Isaiah 11:1, 6–8)

Dear Friends,

Each December, as we begin the new liturgical year, we encounter the voice of the prophet Isaiah, that beacon of hope for the people of Israel amidst the chaos, fear, and disintegration that so often marked their lives in the times of the Old Testament.

Isaiah's prophecy above offers a beautiful vision of justice and peace. The shoot coming out of the stump of Jesse offers the hope of new life springing out from something that appeared lifeless. Isaiah dreams that this new heir of David will create human communities that mirror the divine vision of radical equality among all people. In fact, his vision of reconciliation goes even further, describing a transformation of the world that extends beyond human beings. Even the competitive and violent instincts of animals will be subdued: wolves shall cohabitate with the lambs they routinely devour; lions and cows will befriend each other. Children will play with poisonous snakes, who will be free of the fear that causes them to strike and bite.

What is particularly striking about Isaiah's vision of radical equality and peace is that it is so far from the reality of the moment in which he wrote. The 8<sup>th</sup> century BCE was time of incredible uncertainty for the people of Israel and Judah. They were under occupation from the Assyrian Empire, which resulted in the need to pay high taxes to their occupiers and live amidst recurring outbreaks of brutal war. Their freedom was under threat. Their internal political leadership was weak and focused on preservation of their own power passing the bulk of the occupation's military and economic burdens onto their own kingdom's laborers and subsistence farmers. King Hezekiah had misjudged the international situation, chosen poor allies in his bid to challenge Assyrian domination, and now the Assyrians had control and their power seemed unchallengeable.

And yet even here, amidst this danger and despair, Isaiah offers a vision of hope for the future. I think it is easy to dismiss the power of these images of reconciliation as rhetorical or poetic. But to do that is to minimize the depth of Isaiah's yearning for this reality. Isaiah himself is unable able to fulfill these hopes of a transformed life and yet that does not diminish the depth of his commitment to this vision of a reconciled creation, a vision for which he worked tirelessly.

This is the kind of hope to which we are called in our own lives, and as citizens of our place and time in history. Whatever the darkness is of which we are most afraid, be it emotional or economic, personal or political, God calls us to look for the coming light, to expect a new dawn where justice will shine forth. As Christians, we do not hope based on a naïve fantasy that our problems will simply disappear because bad things shouldn't happen to good people. Rather, we hope that God will come to us, walk with us through our darkness, whatever it may be, leading us towards liberation and freedom from fear.

The true source of this hope is a tiny, vulnerable, helpless child, who calls forth from us new depths of compassion, care, trust, and love. We have hope because we know that Christ's love inspires us to become children of light, that we may bring light into a weary world. In this season of long nights and preparations to encounter Christ anew, we are confident in our hope that God can pierce through any darkness that we, our lives, or the world could possibly create. May we be signs of that hope for others.

This is due to the pageant and rehearsals, which start after the children's sermon on Dec 4<sup>th</sup>, and the timing of the holidays – we didn't think anyone would want class on Christmas or New Year's!

Given this, we have gotten a head start on some pre-Nativity lessons in November. Both Atria are going well, with good attendance and happy and engaged children. Often they are each engaged on their mats with a different activity. They are so good about putting things back and taking turns. We started the month learning about the Holy Land, showing them on relief maps the places Jesus went. We then heard the Annunciation, where Mary is visited by an angel with news of the baby. Catechesis II, our older group, is also learning the less familiar story of Mary visiting Elizabeth. (Notice how many of the Bible stories we present in the Catechesis curriculum feature women.) Finally on the first Sunday of Advent we discussed Advent and made small wreaths.

In December the children will all be welcome to join in the pageant, and learn the full Nativity story in the best way, by helping to act and tell it. See the pageant entry for details of rehearsals. Just in case any of the younger ones find the big Sunday rehearsals a bit much, we will keep an Atrium open to provide a quiet retreat.

This morning the universe danced before you as you sang – it loves that song!


