

# ST. PAUL'S EPISTLE

February 2009

Dear Friends,

February is the month of St. Valentine's Day. I have some pretty clear memories of my elementary school celebrations. The teacher would decorate a cardboard box with a slit at the top much like a mail box. And each of us would put in a small valentine addressed to every member of the class. That was the rule. Each of us sent a valentine to <u>everyone</u> else. As we got older, say fourth or fifth grade, a group of us would grumble that there were some people we didn't want to send valentines to. It didn't matter.

As I think back on that exercise that we did every year from Grade 1 to 8, I am realizing something really wonderful about the idea. I'm sure the rule was in place so no one's feelings would be hurt. But, consciously or not, the teachers were giving us a model for relationship that we don't often get as adults: the idea that everyone is deserving of love and attention.

What if we all thought that way all the time? What would the world look like if those rules applied all the time? Of course, Valentine's Day is a commercial celebration that expresses affection in many ways. Valentines still take center stage in most relationships. As we get older and our relationships become more and more intimate, the number of valentines we share are few. Sometimes we only share one with the person with whom we are closest. That valentine surely has special meaning and it should.

I have wondered whether God's loving message to us in the gift of Jesus Christ cannot be understood as the most intimate acknowledgement of how much we are loved. And that gift, that message is given to everyone without exception, just like those early valentines.

Our world is in such turmoil now. Wars, financial challenges, social upheaval, political unrest, and strain on natural resources may contribute to our not noticing God's love in the midst of it all. Until February 25<sup>th</sup> we continue to celebrate the Epiphany of our Lord. It is during these weeks that we are called to be mindful of the great loving gift God has given us. Epiphany is the manifestation of God in the world through Jesus Christ. Everyday during this time of the church year we are reminded that no matter what befalls us or who we are or how many there are, God is with us. Everyone gets the loving care of God; everyone gets the greatest "I LOVE YOU" message that God has sent and continues to send to us.

I am thinking at this moment that God's message of love to us also contains the hope that we all share when we offer love: "WILL YOU BE MINE?" God asks that of us all the time. Even though God's love is given freely and unconditionally, God hopes that we recognize that God needs us in God's life. God needs us to share that gift of love to the world. God needs us to make sure that everyone gets the message.

This letter is a valentine. Everyone without exception gets the message of love and affection from me to you.

# **Catechesis Corner**



It seems like a long time since we have been together! December was filled with pageant rehearsals culminating in the most wonderful Pageant!

Despite seemingly weekly Sunday snowstorms, we are back on schedule having met again on January 4<sup>th</sup> and what better follow up to our Pageant than to combine classes and hear the Nativity story. We finished up session 2 with the Presentation in the Temple and the parable of The Leaven. The children worked their small hands through yeast and dough; highlight of the year for many children.

As Lent and Easter approach, our classes will hear an extension of the Good Shepherd introducing the wolf and the hired hand. The children will create colorful and festive Alleluia banners to adorn our church as well as a Lenten garden. As the season changes so do the linens and Frank's chasuble. Our session culminates with the Last Supper and a combined class to work hands on with the city of Jerusalem model as it was at the time of Jesus.
