
ST. PAUL'S EPISTLE

Dear Friends,

I was talking with an old friend of mine a few weeks ago and she asked me if I still gave up things for Lent. When we were young we fasted from cookies, candy, TV, or movies, etc. This was a practice of discipline that would strengthen us spiritually and build character in understanding deferred gratification, I think. I'm not sure if fasting did that or not.

Also, in those days people fasted from certain foods. For forty days (not counting Sundays) people fasted from meat, milk and eggs. Some only had one light meal a day. Shrove Tuesday is celebrated with food that consists mainly of meat (bacon, sausages, etc.) and pancakes (eggs, milk, flour). These are things that were historically consumed or removed from the household on the day before Ash Wednesday. We humans have wonderful imaginations—to make a celebration in preparation for a long fast.

In the recent past there has been a strong suggestion that instead of giving something up, we strive to do something productive and healing for the world around us. I think this is a great and appropriate response for us as we contemplate all that Jesus did for us.

Although the act of doing good works in the world is sacred and holy, it is not the same as fasting. Fasting as prayer and discipline really does benefit us in deep and spiritual ways. When we "give up" something we make a space in our life that usually isn't there—the space that is filled with whatever may distract us. Recognizing that each of us carries a poverty of spirit, a deep sense for the need of God in our lives can be realized if we leave space so that thirst for God becomes evident to us. As we go along in our daily lives, responding to the needs of our families, carrying out our responsibilities, pursuing the goals we have for living, we may not attend to the profound spiritual need we all have for the gift of love God offers in Jesus Christ. Breaking the rhythm by fasting opens up an opportunity to be intentional about our profound need of God and to become deeply aware of God's profound need of us.

During Lent we have time to be truly aware of God's companionship with us as we enter into this new part of life at St. Paul's. As we strive to know God's love and support, we will be able to imagine the new things that God is preparing for us. In this time with God who rests in our very souls, we will be able to be confident and hopeful with great expectations. Leaving space, fasting, doing good works gives God a chance to inspire new visions in all of us.

The invitation of Lent is always for the deepening of our love for God in Jesus Christ. Offering the discipline of good works as well as a self-imposed fast of one's own choosing can make this and every Lent a time of deep spiritual abundance. As we prepare for the great and eternal gift of the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

This year the committee will be focusing on "Green Initiatives" at the church and beyond. Once the Grant program is in full swing, we will apply for a grant to help us offset the cost of initiatives that are noted at St. Paul's.


Dear St. Paul's,
