#### Dear Friends,

There is some indication that the custom of making New Year's resolutions began in 153 BC. People began looking at the time past and wondering about the time ahead. At first the resolve was to make amends with enemies made, pay debts and resolve to do better. I think resolutions are all about doing better than before—better at those things we feel important for our well being. For some that may mean doing less of a thing; for some it may mean doing more of a thing. For some it may mean to stop doing a thing.

Usually resolutions are about personal health, relationships, work. Sometimes resolutions are about eating or not; exercising; reading; studying. Of course they vary depending on what we are doing in our lives or where we are on our life's journey. And, yes, some people don't make resolutions at all. At least they don't make them because of the New Year. In fact, I think most of us make resolutions all year as we go along.

What is really wonderful about the making-resolutions process is that it necessitates self reflection. It causes us to stop and ponder. This is the greatest asset of making resolutions. Keeping them is really great but the exercise of thinking about ourselves and how we want to be is greater still.

On January 6<sup>th</sup> the church celebrates the feast of the Epiphany. This is the first manifestation of Jesus Christ to the Gentiles. The Magi, who came from a far away and different nation than the one in which Jesus was born, represent for us, all the world outside of Israel. Their presence at the manger is the sign that all of humanity is included in the divine love and redemption that Jesus promises.

The light of the star guided them to the place. They resolved to follow that light until they discovered its destiny and theirs. Not much is known about the Magi except that they were probably learned in astronomy and had some wealth. Yet, these people knew, somehow, that they were being guided into a new place. They were being guided to a new world of being.

Eventually they came to the place where Jesus and his family were still residing. On the way they met the jealous and fearful Herod who asked them to stop on their way back to tell him where the child was. But something profound happened to them in Bethlehem. They met Jesus. And in a dream (perhaps it was self reflection) they were prompted to go back a different way from which they came. That is what happens to all of us when we are met with Jesus. We go a different way.

Because of the distractions of our lives; the busyness of everyday living whatever that is for us, we often lose our connection to Jesus. That is why we have to keep meeting with him and each time we do we go a different way. Jesus helps us to see the better way in all things.

As we make resolutions this year, I invite you to resolve to keep reconnecting with Jesus. Connect with his hopes for you, his vision for you, and especially his unbounded love for you. Jesus can help you keep any good resolution you make.

#### How Green Are We?

The ground outside may still be white, but the Stewardship Committee is thinking green. Compact fluorescent bulbs use less energy than conventional bulbs and last much longer, saving both money and energy in the long run. To keep St. Paul's as green as possible, we plan to replace the light bulbs in the library and elsewhere in the building with compact fluorescent bulbs.



## Word Search


In the word search at right, circle the words from this Bible verse.





