Dear Friends,

When you receive this Epistle we will have begun the Lenten Journey initiated by the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday. The first Sunday of Lent which is called *Quadragesima* (forty days) marks the beginning of the first full week of the season. During these days we are called to prayer, fasting and self denial in order to ready our hearts, mind, body and spirits to experience the Holy Days of the Passion of Jesus and his Resurrection from the dead.

Many people give up something for Lent. Some people give up various forms of sweets, like cookies or ice cream or chocolate. Some give up forms of entertainment like movies, concerts, television or video games. In addition to making a difference to our physical lives, fasting does a remarkable thing for our spiritual lives.

In depriving ourselves of something we enjoy, we open a space in our lives that has been previously filled with something we really don't need. We become open. God fills that void if we let God in. God wants to be that which we can never give up. Fasting is a way to let God into our lives, into our hearts, mind, and soul.

Some people have noted that the from the beginning of Lent (Ash Wednesday) to the end of Lent (Good Friday) there are more than forty days, which is true. However, Sundays are never included as fast days or Lenten Days. Sunday, every Sunday, is the Day above all days for the Christian world. Every Sunday is a commemoration of the Resurrection. It is always a day of joy in which we offer God great Thanksgiving and Praise for all God does for us especially in giving us Jesus Christ. It is a day on which we gather with friends and family to enjoy the life God has given us and to remember God's love for us and all human kind. Sundays of Lent are not counted as part of the Lenten Journey.

How will you take time during these days to remember God's love for you? How will you carve out something from your life so that God can be palpably present for you? How will you remember that Christ's life, death and resurrection is a gift of love to you from God?

"Lent" means spring or lengthening of days. Even in these serious and deeply sacred days we are shown by all things that surround us to see that the darkness is passing away. Daylight is already with us longer than it was yesterday. In some places here in New England the tips of crocuses are beginning to appear. The snow is melting. Our lives in Christ are always like this holding: the promise that there is always light to dispel the darkness and new life that constantly enriches us.

Catechesis Corner



February was a great month for both Catechesis classes. Catechesis I continues to welcome some new children, so we have been repeating some 'old favorites' such as the Good Shepherd story as will as introducing new activities (water is always a hit) and parables. A new addition to the Catechesis II atrium is a lovely marble font, rescued by Frank from a parish which was closing. A 'baptism area' is something we have wished for for some time, and the children enjoyed learning about it, pouring water etc - very fortuitously, right before Noah Anderson-LaPorte's baptism. Both classes have also made colorful "Alleluia banners" which will hang in church until Lent, then reappear at Easter.

Lent begins in March this year, and Easter stories, such as the Last Supper and our wonderful City of Jerusalem model, will be a focus of our lessons in both classes. Tying in very well with this theme will be our special event:



Even our youngest children seem to make the connection between the Eucharist and the Last Supper, and understand perhaps better than we adults the mystery of the Eucharist. A special memory from the last instructed Eucharist was a 3-year-old girl gazing at her wafer in awe and whispering "How does it happen?"

The fifth annual Belle of the Ball prom dress collection program kicked off on Feb 1 and continues through April 3. Belle of the Ball is all about making certain that the high cost of a prom dress does not prevent any high school junior or senior girl from taking part in this very special night. All donated dresses (any size) must be damage-free, "gently worn", and no more than 3-4 years old. The dresses are collected and dry cleaned at no charge by Anton's Cleaners and a "boutique" is held in mid-April at Simmons College in Boston where girls "shop" for free dresses. College in Boston where girls "shop" for free dresses. High school junior and senior girls must be pre-qualified by guidance counselors, teachers, and social service agency personnel. Last year 280 girls attended the boutique and 4500 dresses were donated in a variety of colors, styles, and sizes. Volunteer personal shoppers assist each participant with finding the perfect dress, donated shoes, purses, and other accessories.
