Dear Friends,

The other day when I left home I noticed that several tiny green sprouts were poking through the ground outside my back door. I was surprised as I am every year when this happens.

The problem is that every year I forget just what exactly is growing in that space. It could be daylilies or gladiolas or tulips or hosta. All I know is that when those little green sprouts full of life and promise come into bloom they will be beautiful. Springtime is such a sentient and spiritual gift. It is a time to think about the renewal of life all around us. What new colors will emerge? What pattern will the revived plants make this year in the garden? What will we need to change, remove, add or rearrange?

Each spring I think about the garden and how it is a metaphor for living. It is a place of surprise and wonder. It reminds us that all life is continually renewed and strengthened. The garden never fails to return in splendor. It responds to our constant care and stewardship.

I have been thinking about the gardens around my house these past few weeks. Perhaps it's a longing for warmer weather; perhaps it's a longing to be surprised by the wonder of new life.

Our Holy Season of Lent is also a time for us to ponder new life in the Resurrection promises of Jesus Christ. We look through the darkness of these days toward the light of Christ's love and the love of God. Some churches do not spend much time reflecting during the Lenten period. They often go from Ash Wednesday directly to Easter. That is not true life. True life acknowledges that we see the light in contrast to the darkness that precedes it. We see light as it defeats the darkness. Lent gives us the opportunity to think about the coming joy and to recognize the journey that brings us there.

As we travel with Jesus through these days, let's pay attention to his love for us; his care for the world as he weeps and mourns over Jerusalem and us; his willingness to be steadfast in the face of challenge even unto to death. As we travel through these days let us also keep in mind the certainty of God's love given to us in the Resurrection.

Elementary Sunday School

They each planted a single paper-white bulb to take home, nurture, and return on Palm Sunday to share in the garden of repose during Holy Week. As we nurture the bulbs and our relationships with God and one another, the younger elementary children will learn about some of Jesus' Parables while the older elementary children prepare puppet show of the passion to be presented to the younger elementary classes on Palm Sunday.

Catechesis Corner



We finished up February with introducing some gestures to the children. Amanda taught the class of nine! That is a record number of children for this church school year so far. Some of these gestures we take for granted and some of us might not even know they have names. I didn't before teaching Catechesis. The sign of peace is a fairly obvious one but perhaps ask your child about Epiclesis. Let us know what they can tell you about it!

For the month of March, the children of Catechesis are concentrating on the meaning of Lent and what we are waiting for. They have changed the linens to purple, have a new Lenten prayer and know we are waiting for Easter and for Jesus Christ's Resurrection. We will talk about the city of Jerusalem, at the time of Christ, using a model of the city created and painted by Louisa Saladino-Kuhl and her daughter Shea. This is usually a favorite with the children; like a huge puzzle. We will discuss the Last Supper and share one together using matzo and grape juice. There are always "seconds" requests. This is always a good time to introduce filling the cruets as by now they have had pouring experience and they can fill the cruets with the grape juice just the way they are filled with wine on the altar. Lastly, our parable for this session will be The Merchant and The Pearl.



Moving Mountains China

In China a student must pay \$300 a year to go to High School. Families cannot afford to send all their children so girls are often left out. With a High School education, a girl is eligible for scholarships to college and could become a

teacher, doctor, journalist, engineer or politician. Last year home baked cookies provided by St. Paul's Girl Scouts helped raise over \$400. We have received a translated letter from our sponsored student, Yan Fei as she

Dear Children of St. Paul's,

Thank you very much for your help. When I knew that I would be sponsored by you, my family and I were very happy. I didn't even know how to express my gratitude.

I am a girl who lives in the countryside. My parents are both peasants. Now, the four boys and girls in our family are all in school. My grandparents are living with us too. My mother is not in good health because of an accident that happened three years ago. My mother often gets headaches and her body often has sudden pains. Since our family doesn't have enough money for my mother to buy medicine, her body is getting thinner and thinner and we are not able to pay back the loans from our relatives.

In our family, only our father has the ability to make money. Our father has spent all the money he has on our education. Maybe you are curious why my father insists on letting us have our education. It is because he believes that only knowledge can change our lives. Our parents had little education but, to this point, they are sure about this.

Your donation is very important to me and to our family. It has given me more confidence in my studies and it has reduced the pressure on my father. So I would like to say thank you to you on behalf of my entire family.

Through my grades and through my actions from now on, I will do my best to show my respect and thankfulness for your help. I will make my dream of going to a university come true. I wish you a safe, happy and healthy life.
