Dear Friends,

ALLELUIA! CHRIST IS RISEN!

Easter was ushered into the world with such joy and beauty in our parish. On this first Monday of Eastertide, I'm still looking back on the week's liturgies with deep appreciation. While it is true that from salvation's perspective it is Easter that makes us, and not we that make Easter, the spirit was so alive and so full during our services that I want to shout "alleluia" all over again. Instead, I'll give each of us a written "alleluia": a poem about Easter resurrection.

John Updike, the prodigious New England writer, and faithful Episcopalian, wrote a 20th century poem entitled "Seven Stanzas at Easter" which eloquently asks us to celebrate resurrection wholeheartedly and unabashedly. It is his "alleluia" and his antidote to all the naysayers who would try to make Easter small and easy to explain. Quite a few of you asked for a copy after it showed up in my Easter Vigil sermon, so here it is again:

Seven Stanzas at Easter

Make no mistake;
if he rose at all,
it is as his body:
if the cell's dissolution did not reverse,
the molecules re-knit,
the amino acids rekindle,
the church will fall.
It was not as the flowers,
each soft spring reoccur;
it was not as his spirit in the mouth and fuddled eyes
of the eleven apostles;
it was as his flesh: ours.

The same hinged thumbs and toes, the same valved heart that-pierced-died, withered, paused, and then re-gathered out of enduring might new strength to enclose.

Let us not mock God with metaphor, analogy, sidestepping, transcendence; making of the event a parable, a sign painted on the faded credulity of earlier ages; let us walk through the open door.

The stone rolled back, not papier-mache, not a stone in a story, but the vast rock of materiality that in the slow grinding of time will eclipse for each of us the wide light of day.

And if we will have an angel at the tomb, make it a real angel weighty and vivid with hair, opaque in the dawn light, robed in real linen, spun on a definite loom.

Let us not seek to make it less monstrous, for our own convenience, our own sense of beauty, lest, awakened in one unthinkable hour, we are embarrassed by the miracle....

It is monstrous, God's Easter undertaking; it is awe-some and fearful, and real.

It is not small, or easy to understand. It cannot be weakened or made pathetic. It is miraculous. Alleluia! Christ is risen!

CATECHESIS CORNER

Dear Catechesis families,

During April we learned together about the stories and places surrounding Easter, including the Last Supper – both with clay figures and sharing our own matzo meals. 
