We are called, by God, to offer it to one another, to our family, friends, neighbors and strangers. In her latest book, The Great Transformation, Karen Armstrong says that compassion can save the world. I believe it. I believe God has given us this gift, another way we are made in God's image, to use it to heal the world in any way we can.

November is just one time in all the time of our lives when we think about Thanksgiving. But in reality we are called to live lives of thanksgiving. We are called to be thankful every day for all those wonders God provides in our lives and for the love embedded in us to share with the world around us.

Meet the Vestry
