Faithful Sharing

"All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God."

(Acts of the Apostles 2:44-46)

As I write this letter to you, the sounds of children in the hallway are ringing through the parish office. They are the young people of St. Paul's Weekday Nursery School, who are learning some of the most fundamental lessons of life here in our church: how to focus on a task, how to be part of a classroom community, and most importantly, how to share. Sharing was not an easy trait for me to learn as a child. I also went to a pre-school at an Episcopal Church, and while there I spent a significant number of hours in time-out on "the green rug," as Mrs. Dunbar tried to teach me the art of sharing and the importance of cultivating a glad and generous heart.

Sharing was at the core of St. Paul's vision for the first groups of Christian disciples. The New Testament tells us that the earliest Christian communities held their goods together in common. While there was private ownership, the needs of the community were considered more important than the personal desires of individuals. For everyone, the highest priority of all was the common mission they shared as a church: to build up, nurture and sustain the gathering of believers in that place and time.

Today, we also engage this same mission in our place and time. Through the many ministries of our church in which we all share – teaching and learning, sending and serving, listening and caring, stewarding and planning, praying and dreaming – we are nurturing and sustaining the intergenerational community of disciples here at St. Paul's Church. Together we are working to build up and expand that community: welcoming newcomers who find us, inviting neighbors and friends to come and see what we're about, and most importantly sharing the joy we find in each other and in a life with Christ. And we do all of this in response to the incredible love that God has for each one of us, and for the whole world.

Later this month, we'll be asked to share in this mission in two important ways. First, we will gather to celebrate the ministries of our parish with Bishop Bud Cederholm at a special service on Sunday, October 30, at 4:00 p.m. This is a special occasion in the life of our parish, and, while it will include my installation as your Rector, it is above all a celebration of the ministry in which we all share together with Christ.

Second, we'll be asked by our Stewardship team to consider what resources we can each share through our pledging to support St. Paul's as we live the Gospel together. As you prayerfully consider how much you can contribute, I hope you will reflect on the value that your participation here at St. Paul's brings to your life. True, authentic sharing comes from "glad and generous hearts." And there is so much about our parish life right now for which to be glad.

"The Gospel According to Matthew"

An Adult Education Forum on Sundays from 9am to 9:45am October 2011

Between now and the first Sunday of Advent, our weekly Gospel lessons will all come from Matthew's Gospel. But what makes Matthew's Gospel different from the others? Who was "Matthew" or whoever it was who wrote this Gospel in his name? How is Matthew's portrayal of Jesus' life, death and resurrection different than Mark's or Luke's? Stewardship Reflection: Supporting the Church Together By Alex Brough



I have just sent in my pledge form for 2012 and penned this note to share with you why I promised to donate to St. Paul's. My contemplation of an answer begins with the large wooden columns that form the arches of the Sanctuary. They are massive at their base: a combination of layered boards supporting each other as they rise to the apex of the ceiling. A single board would snap under the weight of the roof, but instead each one is united with another reaching across the church aisle to form an angled support. It is the series of these paired arches, covered and enclosed by the roof, that form the body of our church. Our belief in Christ brings life into that body.

In a way, we are all the boards that make up these columns. Each of our individual pledges blends with the pledges of others to support our congregation. Some of the contributions will be routed for maintenance of our physical structure; even strong arches need support. Beyond the physical plant, there is so much more to celebrate. Our contributions go directly to our spiritual development through sermons and adult education. Some money will be used to educate our children in our faith. Even beyond our Church, our ministry extends into our larger Bedford and regional community. A pledge is a promise of donation and is vital to maintaining our Church. Elementary Sunday School

Elementary classes begin with singing each Sunday at 9:45 in the parish hall. CATECHESIS CORNER



Welcome back, to new and returning children and their families!

The "Catechesis of the Good Shepherd" program has restarted, with our two lovely, sunny Atria and their materials all clean and shelves relatively bare. We have a few newcomers, and many continuing children. For those new to St. Paul's or to the program, this is a Montessori-based curriculum which we offer to children from about 3 years old through Kindergarten. It features very short presentations of materials from church, and basic parables and narratives, and many hands-on materials children can use on their own, for as long or short a time as they wish. We have found in over ten years that it appeals to quiet and active children alike, and in particular to the youngest.

Those familiar with the program will know that we didn't invent it – it was developed in Italy by Sofia Cavalletti, along with Gianna Gobi, beginning in 1954. They developed the materials and curriculum by observing what children most responded to, based on the belief that they already share a special relationship with God. Sadly, Cavalletti passed away this summer, at the age of 94. We have some of her books available to borrow, for those who would like to learn more.

On most Sundays, the children begin by gathering with others in the Parish Hall for music at 9:45. We begin Catechesis at 10:00, and join families in church for Communion. On **Family Sundays** (**first Sunday of the month, beginning Oct 2**), all join the service in church. Catechesis I children (the younger group) have the option to go back to the Atrium following the Children's sermon if they wish. Please let us know if there are any questions or issues – separation is often tricky at this point in the year.

Many thanks to Carol Hokana, who is putting together the schedule this session, and to those adults and youth who have volunteered to lead classes (as "Catechists") or to assist with that essential extra pair of hands. We could really use more adults – parents or others. Please let Carol, or either or us, know if you can help. Assisting takes little time and no preparation, and is a great way to be with the children and see what we do.

On October 16, after church, we will have our first meeting of the year. We will try beginning jointly with the Elementary teachers and Rev. Chris, then splitting off to discuss upcoming lessons etc in more detail. We'll also be looking to arrange some convenient training for newer Catechists and a meeting for church school parents – watch the St. Paul's email for details and let us know if you may be interested so we can pick good times!

OUTREACH AT ST. PAUL'S OCTOBER MISSION OF THE MONTH: Habitat for

Humanity

October 3 is World Habitat Day

The United Nations has established the first Monday of October (10/3) as "World Habitat Day." The purpose of this international event is:

- To call attention to the current global state of the human habitat
- To push toward adequate housing for all
- To dismantle and alter the systems that reinforce and entrench poverty housing
- To make an affordable, decent place to live a reality for all

Habitat for Humanity International, as well as its local affiliates, will mark the event with both action and prayer, beginning on October 3rd and running for six weeks, culminating with the annual Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter Work Project, taking place this year in Léogâne, Haiti from November 5-12. Léogâne is regarded as the epicenter of the catastrophic earthquake that struck the impoverished island nation in January 2010.

As a Covenant Church partner with Habitat for Humanity of Greater Lowell, St. Paul's will focus its October outreach efforts on ways we can fulfill our obligation to support to the construction of affordable housing in our local area. Among our scheduled events, we will:

- Say a special "Prayer for Community" on **Sunday, October 2nd**, asking God to forgive our blindness to the basic human need for shelter, and to strengthen our resolve as we work to make decent housing a reality for all
- Volunteer as a group at the Carter Way work site on North Road, on **Saturday, October 15th** (spots are limited)

Habitat for Humanity International is an ecumenical Christian ministry that welcomes to its work all people dedicated to the cause of eliminating poverty housing. Since its founding in 1976, Habitat has built, rehabilitated, repaired or improved more than 400,000 houses worldwide, providing simple, decent and affordable shelter for more than two million people. For more information, or to donate or volunteer, visit habitat.org.

Habitat for Humanity of Greater Lowell (HFHGL) is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization that works to strengthen families and communities through affordable homeownership opportunities. HFHGL works in partnership with corporations, like-minded community groups, faith-based organizations, and individual volunteers to develop communities with people in need by building and renovating simple, decent, energy efficient, affordable homes. Since its founding in 1991, HFHGL has built or renovated a total of 24 homes in Bedford, Billerica, Concord, Lowell, Reading, and Westford. To date, HFHGL's largest completed project was a 3-duplex, located at Harmony Way in Lowell. HFHGL projects have placed more than 80 people into quality housing. In addition, HFHGL has funded the construction of 38 homes globally through HFHI's Tithing program.



Calling all Torchbearers, Gospelers and Crucifers!

IMPORTANT ALTAR SERVER TRAINING Sunday October 23



Our new rector, Chris Wendell, has lots to share with us, so make sure you attend this important training for ALL SERVERS – including new recruits and those who are already trained. We have some changes to make in altar roles and responsibilities. And just to mix things up, we will start with PIZZA and a discussion and then break into groups for training or practice.

Attention New Altar servers!

Two Torchbearers serve at each service. They follow the cross, carrying lighted torches in the procession and they bring the torches to the reading of the Gospel. Children grade 2 and older are eligible to be Torchbearers. Adults are also welcome. There is a Crucifer and Gospeler at each service. The Crucifer carries the cross in the procession and assists at the Altar. The Gospeler lights and extinguishes the candles, carries the Gospel and assists as necessary. Both the older servers help the younger Torchbearers. Youth may serve as Gospelers beginning in grade 6. Adults always welcome.

November 6th there will be a children's craft workshop at the church after service.


