Friends,

I am writing this letter while the tide is out on Skaket Beach. There is something about walking way out over the sand where the ocean bay water once filled in the space. There is something about venturing far out beyond what seemed impossible a few hours earlier.

Many thoughts had an opportunity to rise in my mind as I walked further and further away from the shore. I thought about how small a human being is when compared to the land or to the ocean or to the crowds on the beach behind us. But then I thought even out there where it seemed desolate at times, in God's eyes we fill God's mind and heart.

I thought about how the ocean and the land and the sky and all the creation in God's eye are fully connected; I thought about how God looks at it all as one piece. And I wondered why it is so difficult for us to see those connections. How is it that we can't get the bonds we have with the people in those places that suffer sickness, poverty, war and fear? I wondered what makes it so hard for us to grasp our true relationship with people and places we don't see with our own eyes. How great it would be if we could see the creation through the eyes of God! One world, one family, one community with the potential of bringing in the kingdom on earth. It would mean finding the way to love each other without trying or demanding that people or nations give up who they are. It would mean finding a way to make harmony out of the differences that God has placed in the world. Sometimes I think that is one of the major responsibilities of humanity; God has given us the gift of the diversity of humanity—like the diversity of instruments and voices in an orchestra—and it is our work to find the way to bring it together to create beauty in the world.

We are entering into our eighth year of ministry together at St. Paul's. Our life here is a model of how to do that very thing. We do it by connecting with one another. Even when we are away we find ways to stay connected. There are many gifts that we offer one another here and gifts that we offer the world around us. One of the telling, life giving graces of this community is the desire to stay connected. And we do that! And we spread it beyond our church borders!

I am always excited as September approaches because it contains the promise of the gathered community. It contains the promise of the fulfillment of our desire to be together as congregation that loves God and loves one another. People will be coming home to St. Paul's slowly at first. Before we know it everyone will be back and it will seem like we never were apart. It seems like that because of the deep sense of Christian love we have for one another. There is the sense that even though some of us were away we were not ever, not even for a moment, disconnected from each other. We do create harmony here. We do bring the gift of diversity to bear on the joy of our community.

It is an exciting time for us as we approach September, homecoming, gathering, family. I hope that your days these past few months were filled with as much joy and relaxation as possible. I hope these days gave you time to connect with family and friends. And I look forward to our being fully

gathered as soon as we all return to our community of faith at St. Paul's.

Meet the Vestry



Sharon Curtin Keane is currently completing her third year on the vestry of St. Paul's. She and her family—husband Bob and daughters Miranda, Aisling, and Rose—began coming to St. Paul's in the spring of 2000. Miranda was a student at St. Paul's Nursery School, and Sharon had met a number of parishioners through the school. She and Bob were looking for a church that was welcoming and that allowed girls (and women) to participate fully in the church. Once they started coming, the girls loved the church school program and were a driving force in getting the whole family to attend regularly. Both Sharon and Bob had grown up in the Roman Catholic Church, but had concerns about the Church and the role of women within the Church, especially as parents of three daughters, and St. Paul's had much appeal for them.

Sharon grew up in Salem, Massachusetts, with her parents, two brothers, and a sister. Her father was an educator serving as a teacher, then principal and finally superintendent of schools in Salem. He was active in the community and felt strongly about political issues, especially those related to public education. Sharon's mother stayed at home when her children were young, but later returned to work for a local small business that publishes a stock newsletter. Although Sharon was raised in the Catholic Church, her mother was a Unitarian, and Sharon feels she was exposed to many views of religion and social responsibility within her family.

Following high school, Sharon attended St. Anselm's College in New Hampshire, studying to become a nurse. Her specialty is psychiatric nursing, and she received her master's degree from Boston College in 1990. Most of her experience has been working with children who have serious emotional problems. She worked at McLean Hospital and in residential programs for children run by the Department of Mental Health. She also worked in private practice for a few years before deciding to stay at home with her growing young family. Sharon is passionate about this work and is

exploring future possibilities of returning to work part-time in this field, now that her daughters are getting older.

A college friend from St. Anselm's thought that her brother and Sharon would be perfect for each other. That brother is Bob, and he and Sharon were married in 1989. Bob is a social worker for the Department of Mental Health. He and Sharon share many common interests, both in their fields of work and in their enjoyment of camping, hiking, biking, and the outdoors. Bob has ten siblings, and together they have over 30 nieces and nephews, so theirs is truly a large extended family with whom they enjoy spending time.

Sharon and Bob moved to Bedford in 1993. Sharon had done a rotation at the VA Hospital in Bedford during her nursing training and liked the area. They felt it was a good mid-point between their two families in Salem and Needham. Here in Bedford, they are active in the community and in the church. Sharon assists with two Girl Scout troops and volunteers in the schools. Her daughters take ballet lessons at St. Paul's on Saturdays. Having taken ballet through her teens, Sharon decided to begin taking lessons herself once they began with ballet and participates in a weekly adult ballet class. This is another passion of Sharon's that may not be well known. She is also a runner and loves activities outdoors—walking the dog, taking bike rides or hikes with her family, and gardening. The Keanes have built an addition to their home this past year and also added a pool, so this summer has included much time swimming for the whole family. Sharon also loves to read.

Here at St. Paul's Sharon enjoys her involvement in teaching, participating in the Advent Fair and Thrift Sale, working to organize activities for the middle school age children for this fall, and especially participating in the Revue last year. She feels the church has given her and her family a sense of community and that it is a special place of nurture and support for them all. Sharon and her family bring much to St. Paul's as well, and will continue to be an important part of our parish family.

Liturgical Training Sessions



ALTAR SERVERS

St. Paul's appreciates the commitment and faithful dedication of those who assist at our altar. Please join us if you are interested in participating. Children and adults serve on a rotating schedule with specific roles in the service. Training is provided each fall including updates for experienced servers.

Torchbearers

Two Torchbearers serve at each service. They follow the cross, carrying lighted torches in the procession and they bring the torches to the reading of the Gospel. Children grade 2 and older are eligible to be Torchbearers. Adults are also welcome.

Acolytes

There is a Crucifer and Gospeller at each service. The Crucifer carries the cross in the procession and assists at the Altar. The Gospeller lights and extinguishes the candles, carries the Gospel and assists as necessary. Both Acolytes help the younger Torchbearers. Youth may serve as Acolytes beginning in grade 6. Adults are always welcome.

From our Director of Music

REPORT TO THE CONGREGATION ON THE NATIONAL ORGAN CONVENTION Chicago, IL.

July 2-6, 2006

The adventure began on Sunday afternoon, after I played the service, and then met my friends (and yours) Cheryl Duerr, Mary Sue Willie and husband, Charles, and flew to Chicago. The convention had actually begun the night before, so all was in full swing by the time of our arrival at the Marriott in the "Magnificent Mile", downtown.

The general session opened that evening with a gala concert at Orchestra Hall in Symphony Center. The entire program was conducted by Julian Wachner (formerly of Boston University's Marsh Chapel, but now principal opera conductor at McGill University in Montreal) and featured a work by him for organ and large orchestra.

Monday opened with a beautiful service at Valparaiso University, followed by a concert back in Chicago at Rockefeller Memorial Chapel, along with the Annual Meeting. We ate lunch on the bus as we drove back. After the meeting, there were workshops and/or concerts to attend (two sessions, back to back), and the exhibits were open to browse in the hotel. Our dinner that night was the only true social affair of the time there. We were transported to Navy Pier for a private dinner with band, and viewed fireworks on the roof afterwards.

This is a capsule of one day. Each day that followed was very similar in scheduling and level of participation. We heard many wonderful organs in downtown Chicago churches, Lincoln Park, Evanston, and Valparaiso University. The workshops were varied and of high quality. I attended three publishers' reading sessions for new anthems, as well as workshops on chant, one dealing with injuries and chronic issues for keyboard players, and our Regional meeting. As usual, I longed for more organ music I could use - the concerts were all done by virtuosi playing recital literature - and found it at the marketplace. My favorite concerts took place on the same day - Thos. Murray, head of the organ dept. at Yale University in the morning, and the choir of Trinity Church, Wall Street, singing "A Song to David" by Wm. Albright that evening. Another outstanding choral group, an a cappella from St. Clement's (Chicago), performed on Thursday morning.

I am grateful to St. Paul's for assisting me in attending this wonderful convention, from which I learned a great deal that will be of benefit to all of us here.
