As we come together as a full worshiping community during these fall months, we come back as always with hope, expectation and new possibilities for our life together this year at St. Paul's.

I pray that these last days of summer offer you continued time for refreshment and relaxation. I pray that these days have been a source of joy and satisfaction for you and those you love. I pray that you stay in the knowledge of God's love for you and all you offer to your family, friends and to our wonderful church.

## **Catechesis Corner**

Welcome back to Catechesis children and their families, new and old! The "Catechesis of the Good Shepherd" is St. Paul's church school program for children age 3 through Kindergarten. This year we will continue to have two classrooms, or Atriums, one for children 3-4 years old and one for Kindergarteners. The program allows each child to choose from many hands-on activities; they don't need to sit still for long!



We will restart on Sunday, September 16<sup>th</sup>, with an orientation in which each child is introduced to his or her teachers and Atrium. This is very important in helping them feel comfortable, and setting the tone for the class. We would also be happy to answer questions about the program, and to hear from new families who may be joining – it was great to see several new children in the pews this summer! The Catechesis program generally follows the same schedule and calendar as the Elementary Church School, with children meeting in the hall at 9:45 most Sundays, going to their Atriums at 10:00 and joining families for Communion. The first Sunday of each month is Family Sunday, when all go to church for a child-oriented service. One difference is that we offer Catechesis I (our younger group) the option of going to their Atrium after the sermon.

As of writing this in August, we don't yet have a detailed curriculum and teacher schedule arranged. As always, offers of help in the classroom, on a rotating basis, are extremely welcome!

We'll have dinner and discussion and some planning for the rest of the year. Hope to see you there!



We will be welcoming a full enrollment of three-year olds in the Tues.- Thurs, classes. There is room for more four & five year olds in either the three or five day classes. Also, as a reminder, the website is www.stpaulsweekdayns.ora Our calendar marks the beginning of school as September 11th, but as usual the teachers will be conducting "home visits" and setting up their rooms during the earlier days of the month.

## <u>Altar Servers</u>



St. Paul's is always seeking adults and children interested in serving at the altar. Torchbearers and Acolytes serve on a rotating schedule with specific roles in the service. Training is provided each fall including updates for experienced servers.

### **Torchbearers**

Two Torchbearers serve at each service. They follow the cross, carrying lighted torches in the procession and they bring the torches to the reading of the Gospel. Children grade 2 and older are eligible to be Torchbearers. Adults are also welcome.

#### Acolytes

There is a Crucifer and Gospeller at each service. The Crucifer carries the cross n the procession and assists at the Altar. The Gospeller lights and extinguishes the candles, carries the Gospel and assists as necessary. Both Acolytes help the younger Torchbearers. Youth may serve as Acolytes beginning in grade 6. Adults always welcome.

We will meet after church to welcome and train new youth and adults who wish to be trained as acolytes or torchbearers. Robes will be fitted and there will be pizza! Please call Caroline Larson if you are planning to attend.

Acolytes and Torchbearers who have served in the past are invited to a short update meeting following church to review tasks and go over new procedures. 


