Abundant Forgiveness

Peter came and said to Jesus, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times. (Mt. 18:21-22)

As you come to know me better through my preaching and reflection on Bible passages, you will learn that I have a special place in my heart for Peter. He's so honest, so human, so well-intentioned but prone to error (do you know anyone like this?). Most of all, he's so curious about who Jesus is. Through their adventures together Peter becomes Jesus' best friend. His friendship endures even when Jesus corrects his errors, even through his own shame at betraying Jesus when the cock crowed, even when Jesus seems to question his love.

In this passage above, which appears in this month's lectionary, Peter thinks he is being generous by expressing his willingness to forgive a fellow disciple's mistakes seven times. In Biblical imagery, seven was code for "a lot." But, as usual, Jesus corrects him – arguing that he must forgive not just "a lot," but "a lot, a lot" (seventy-seven times!). Peter takes this good heartedly, though I'm sure he was a bit daunted at Jesus' instruction to be so forgiving. Perhaps we are, too.

Forgiveness is not an easy thing. It's not easy because it is so meaningful, so holy. If you have ever been forgiven by someone else for a personal failing, lapse in judgment, or embarrassing oversight, you will know how much of a blessing true forgiveness is. Forgiveness means that you can openly acknowledge what happened, agree on a shared story about the wrongdoing, and agree that there is no longer any debt – real or emotional – to be repaid. Forgiveness frees a person from having to forget or hide the truth. It allows the truth to be spoken, without acrimony, resentment or bitterness, which enables the relationship between the parties to deepen.

As we begin our ministry together, I know that in the years ahead, there will be many occasions on which I will need to ask forgiveness from one or many of you. Our shared ministry of being church, building up the kingdom of God, and serving God's mission of compassion and reconciliation is not easy. There are many discernments to be made, and while I am confident that the Holy Spirit has wonderful things in store for us, I am also sure we will all make mistakes along the way from time to time. We'll move too quickly, or not quickly enough. We'll become attached to our idea, project, or priority, and lose sight of the bigger picture. We'll fail to honor the roles that we all play in our parish's decision making processes. The everyday hurts and wounds of community life can be challenging, even though they are normal. Keeping in mind Christ's instruction to maintain an attitude of forgiveness will guide us all into the grace and mercy we need to be church together for the sake of the world.

Finally, I want to remind us all that this month marks the 10th Anniversary of the terrorist attacks on September 11th. I wonder how we are doing in our journey towards deeper forgiveness of the people who orchestrated these attacks, as individuals, as a community, and as a nation. How fresh are these wounds? Are we more grieved by the attacks or by how we've responded to them over the past ten years? We'll be finding special ways to mark this anniversary during our service on Sunday 9/11, and I also hope you will join me at a town-wide ecumenical service of remembrance that evening, to be held at 7:30 p.m. at the First Church of Christ (UCC).

Office Volunteers' Needed -- no, not THAT type of office volunteer!

One of the recurring themes during my conversations with the search committee last spring is that many in the parish are looking for more opportunities for spiritual or reflective engagement -- rather than to take on another task, committee, or project. To that end, I am seeking a group of people who would like to gather with me once a day (Monday through Thursday) for about 20 minutes to pray the Daily Office. The Daily Office (a.k.a. Morning Prayer, Noonday Prayer, Evening Prayer) is the most basic form of regular prayer offered by the Episcopal tradition. It can be found in the front of the prayer book and includes Bible readings, intercessions and collects. It also provides an occasion to learn about all the Holy Women and Holy Men appointed for each day in the Episcopal calendar of saints. As the months go by, the regularity of prayer at the same time each day brings with it a new and deeper perspective on faith and spirituality. I highly recommend this spiritual practice! If you are interested, please contact me by September 15. I am open to gathering in the morning or at noontime, as people's schedules allow.

CATECHESIS CORNER

Official registration will be after church on Sunday, Sept. 11. But an earlier phone call or email would be helpful. The first day for the children will be Sunday, Sept. 18. This will be an 'orientation' day, where we meet in the church hall and they are taken individually to their classroom or "Atrium" as we call it. Parents are welcome to come see them too.

As always, we need plenty of people to keep this active program going through the year. Please let us know if you would be willing to help, even a little! We particularly invite middle and high school youth, including new sixth graders (many of whom are Catechesis graduates!), to consider whether this is a way you would like to serve St. Paul's.

We look forward to seeing children, teachers and families soon – we've missed you!

Calling all Torchbearers, Gospelers and Crucifers!

IMPORTANT ALTAR SERVER TRAINING Sunday

October 23. Thanks to all who served faithfully at the altar this summer. We are now gearing up for a fall training with Rev. Chris Wendell. This IMPORTANT training will be for ALL SERVERS – including new recruits and those who are already trained. We have one or two changes to make in altar roles and responsibilities. And just to mix things up, we will start with pizza and a discussion and then break into groups for training or practice.

Attention New Altar servers!

Two Torchbearers serve at each service. They follow the cross, carrying lighted torches in the procession and they bring the torches to the reading of the Gospel. Children grade 2 and older are eligible to be Torchbearers. Adults are also welcome. There is a Crucifer and Gospeler at each service. The Crucifer carries the cross in the procession and assists at the Altar. The Gospeler lights and extinguishes the candles, carries the Gospel and assists as necessary. Both Acolytes help the younger Torchbearers. Youth may serve as Acolytes beginning in grade 6. Adults always welcome.

O God, midwife us into all our beginnings. Amen.


